#### Call to Order

• Sheila Polk, Chair called the Arizona Substance Abuse Partnership (ASAP) meeting to order at 1:06 PM with 17 members present. **Ms. Polk** reviewed virtual meeting platform procedures.

#### Welcome/Introductions

- Sheila Polk, Chair, welcomed everyone to the February ASAP meeting.
- Sara Salek, Vice-Chair, conducted roll call of the ASAP members in attendance.

### **Approval of Minutes**

- Sheila Polk, Chair, requested a final review of the December 2, 2021 meeting minutes.
- **Andrew LeFevre** motioned to accept the December 2, 2021 minutes without revision.
- **Douglas Sargent** seconded the motion. The motion passed with no dissenting votes.

## Arizona Department of Juvenile Corrections' Role in Prevention and Treatment

- Sara Salek, Vice Chair, invited Douglas Sargent to give a presentation of Arizona Department of Juvenile Corrections' (ACJC) Role in Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment.
- Douglas Sargent introduced the agency's Clinical Director, Dr. Raymonda Matheka.
  Dr. Matheka shared that of the 120 youth in the community on parole, 48 youth are from Adobe Mountain School, 72 youth are from other states, and are currently living in Arizona under the Interstate compact.
- Dr. Matheka provided an overview of the Arizona Department of Juvenile Corrections' youth facility, Adobe Mountain School. Dr. Matheka shared details of the two-week intake process at Adobe Mountain School called RAC (Reception, Assessment, and Classification). Dr. Matheka explained that the intake process is performed by mental health professionals and medical staff to determine the individualized treatment needs of the youth. Dr. Matheka shared that the screenings utilize a trauma informed care approach. Dr. Matheka stated that the Adobe Mountain School has 2 housing units that are designated for the treatment of significant substance use disorders and is partially funded by the Arizona Residential Substance Abuse Treatment program grant (RSAT), granted by the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission. Dr. Matheka provided specific details about the RSAT program.

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- Dr. Matheka shared details about The Seven Challenges evidence-based treatment program that was designed specifically for adolescents. Dr. Matheka explained that substance use among youth is very different from adults who abuse substances, and that The Seven Challenges programs helps to address the needs of youth who abuse substances, more effectively. Dr. Matheka explained that the program creates a climate where youth can feel comfortable to express themselves in a climate of mutual respect. Dr. Matheka shared that the program has seen a lot of success based on participant exit surveys. Participants reported that participating in the program helped them to reach their treatment goals. Dr. Matheka described the specialized trauma treatments that are used at Adobe Mountain School and how they work. Dr. Matheka provided a brief overview of Adobe Mountain School's on-site medical clinic and treatment modalities. Dr. Matheka provided an overview of the Arizona Department of Juvenile Corrections' Naloxone Training and Distribution Program as well as the goals of the initiative.
- Sara Salek, Vice-Chair, thanked Dr. Matheka for her public service and presentation.
- Sara Salek, Vice-Chair, shared that the naloxone program was based on a conversation at a previous ASAP meeting, and that the discussions are making a difference. Dr. Salek explained that Jeff Hood previously shared his concerns about losing youth to opioid overdose after returning to the community, prompting the discussion.
- Sara Salek, Vice-Chair, commended ACJC and the Department of Health Services on their work with leveraging free naloxone to the community through the State Opioid Response Grant. Dr. Salek also acknowledged Merilee Fowler and her efforts in providing training to the community.
- Sara Salek, Vice-Chair, also commended the ADJC medical staff for their work in adjusting the narcan training and language to be more relatable to youth.
- Andrew LeFevre thanked Dr. Salek for her statement about the RSAT program, and also thanked ACJC for providing funding and would like to continue the long-standing partnership.
- Dr. Salek, Vice-Chair, thanked Dr. Matheka for her presentation.

## Graham County Substance Abuse Coalition's Role in Prevention and Recovery

- Sheila Polk, Chair, introduced Kathy Grimes to provide an overview of the Graham County Substance Abuse Coalition's role in prevention and recovery.
- Ms. Grimes provided an overview of the coalition, their mission and goals. Ms. Grimes shared information on several partnerships and projects throughout Graham County. She provided information on a partnership between the coalition and the DUI Taskforce to provide awareness about the importance of utilizing designated drivers. The coalition will also be hosting a prescription drug take-back day in April. The event will include law enforcement, the fire department and several other community organizations. Another program created is called, "Who's Watching the Punch." This was established to remind parents to have clear expectations about underage drinking. Banners and flyers with prevention messaging have been disseminated throughout the community. Ms. Grimes stated that funding provided by the Governor's Office of Youth, Faith and Family has allowed the Graham County Substance Abuse Coalition to provide additional resources

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and programming, which include ACEs training, sharing that she has recently received reports of children as young as 3<sup>rd</sup> grade vaping at school. The coalition is working on a project geared towards 6<sup>th</sup> graders, in collaboration with the probation department and school districts. The Graham County Substance Abuse Coalition has a partnership with the Substance Abuse Coalition Leaders of Arizona (SACLAZ), to provide narcan and fentanyl training to adults and youth, reaching over 800 youth so far. Information on a pilot project was shared, in collaboration with ACJC and Mohave County and Yavapai County. This project will address trauma among youth. The Graham County Substance Abuse Coalition opened a sober living home in April 2021 called House of Hope, to help provide recovery support and that the coalition was awarded a grant from the Graham County United Way, which funds the Recovery Angels support program. The program provides support and resources for those going through rehabilitation.

- Sheila Polk, Chair, commended Ms. Grimes and the work of the coalition.
- Sara Salek, Vice-Chair, asked if there have been any concerns from community members regarding narcan programs in schools. **Ms. Grimes** states that initially there were some concerns, but that some schools have gained more information and are now more receptive.
- Sara Salek, Vice-Chair, asked if the reason that the coalition has been able to overcome the initial obstacles with working in the schools is because of the relationships that have been established through the coalition work in the community. Ms. Grimes stated that the relationships that have been built with schools over the last 18 years has helped garner trust. Dr. Salek thanked Ms. Grimes for the work of the coalition.

Sheila Polk, Chair, reiterated the importance of building relationships and trust.

## Work Group Updates

- Sheila Polk, Chair, moved on to the next agenda item of the ASAP Work Group Updates. Ms. Polk asked Deborah Jones to provide an update on the Program Inventory Workgroup. Dr. Deborah Jones provided a brief history of the workgroup and its current project. Dr. Jones reported that the workgroup is currently focused on gathering and organizing data about evidence-based programs and practices, as well as outcomes and outputs, in an effort to create consistent measures that will help determine the effectiveness of funded programs. This will help to determine if the programs are measuring the intended effects.
- Sheila Polk, Chair, thanked Dr. Jones for the presentation and stated that she is looking forward to progress reports, as well as the information obtained upon completion of the project.
- Sheila Polk, Chair, invited Dr. Salek to provide updates on the Epidemiology Workgroup. Sara Salek, Vice-Chair, shared that the workgroup meets monthly and the current work includes the completion of a data inventory. Dr. Salek explained that the project is in collaboration with AHCCCS, ACJC and ADHS. Sara Salek, Vice-Chair, shared that Dr. Runger of Arizona State University presented an initial analysis of data pertaining to psychostimulant overdose rates. The workgroup will receive updates on the findings. Also, Dr. Runger is cross-referencing overdose data across substances, as well as comparing overdose rates of persons receiving Medicaid versus those that don't

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receive Medicaid benefits. He is currently seeking approval to share data. **Dr. Salek, Vice-Chair**, shared that the ASU analysis is funded by the State Opioid Response Grant. **Dr. Salek, Vice-Chair**, shared that ADHS recently launched an updated opioid dashboard on their website (azhealth.gov/opioid).

- Sheila Polk, Chair, thanked Dr. Salek for her leadership and work with the workgroup.
- Sara Salek, Vice-Chair, shared how leveraging work with the state universities have helped to inform the work.
- Andy LeFevre mentioned the possibility of utilizing funding to work with ASU in creating new data dashboards, looking at how student data and health data intersect. **Dr. Salek** agreed and stated that it is beneficial to leverage the existing capacity of the state through the research institutions like Arizona State University.
- Sara Salek, Vice-Chair stated that the next Epidemiology Workgroup meeting is scheduled for February 10, 2022 at 2 p.m.

### 2022 Meeting Dates

• Sara Salek, Vice-Chair, announced that the next ASAP meeting is Thursday, May 5, 2022 at 1:00 p.m. Dr. Salek stated that is was the consensus to meet virtually for todays' meeting, and that we will let everyone know if the next meeting will be hybrid or virtual closer to the meeting date.

### Adjourn

- Chairperson Polk requested a motion to adjourn the meeting.
- Andrew LeFevre asked what the process is to making a request to get on a future agenda.
- Sheila Polk, Chair, invited members to reach out to her if they have ideas for the next agenda.
