Mission

Develop trauma-informed substance abuse policy recommendations, strategic collaboration, and statewide initiatives to strengthen the state of substance abuse prevention, enforcement, treatment and recovery efforts.

Description

The Arizona Substance Abuse Partnership (ASAP) is authorized under <u>Executive Order 2013-05</u> (which amends and supersedes Executive Order 2007-12) to serve as the single public, statewide council on substance abuse prevention, enforcement, treatment, and recovery efforts. ASAP consists of members appointed by the Governor. ASAP initiates and supports improvements in substance abuse policy, develops dynamic partnerships, participates in datadriven planning processes, assists with coordinating efforts supported by program evaluations, and makes recommendations to the Governor.

Executive Summary

The Arizona Substance Abuse Partnership's (ASAP) strategic plan reflects goals to be accomplished in three key areas:

Goal 1: Develop and support statewide prevention and early intervention efforts. ASAP will develop a statewide data profile, enhance the development and dissemination of targeted community resources and make policy and funding recommendation.

Goal 2: Increase access to substance abuse care and recovery services. ASAP will develop an interagency marketing strategy to promote the Arizona Substance Abuse Provider Locator and Opioid Assistance and Referral Line, and make policy and funding recommendations.

Goal 3: Support law enforcement and criminal justice initiatives aimed at reducing substance abuse and that promote public safety. ASAP will provide strategic support for the Second Chance Act grant administered by the Department of Correction, research potential technology based solutions to enhance the availability of substance abuse treatment and recovery resources within ADC and make policy recommendations.
